- why nations go to war

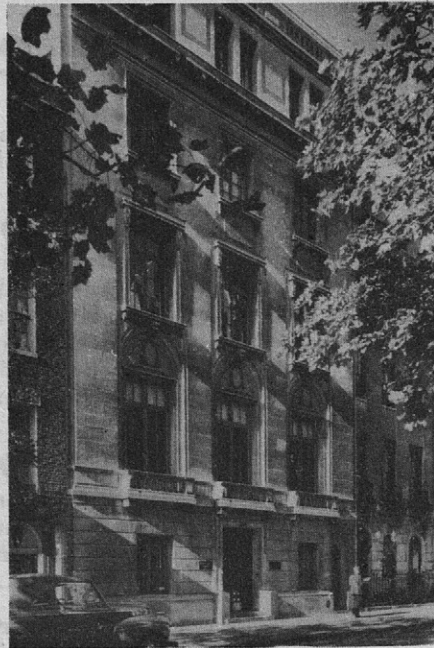
and a host of similar questions of vital interest to every thinking person.
