

### Postscript

My "postscripts" in the last two issues of the Henry George News have reached more words than I had intended, in fact more than the editorial committee should have allowed. News from my desk has been passed along through the regular news items in this paper, but it seems there are always last minute matters of interest.

A special mailing of literature to 6,000 Episcopal ministers has brought good response. Another mailing to 3,000 Quakers has also been made with satisfactory results.

The Milwaukee Journal (Sunday edition, October 17) carried a story about the Henry George School.

The title was "Henry George Disciples still boosting his ideas." We have had from this a number of requests for more information as well as an invitation to address a study group in Minneapolis, a church congregation in Wisconsin and several inquiries for the correspondence course.

From Boston we have the good news that new classes in Fundamental Economics and International Trade will be underway shortly.

A friend from Canada attending an international conference on postwar plans in Washington, D. C., visited me last week in New York. Imagine my delight when she said: "You must tell me more about Henry George. So many delegates at the conference were talking about him and asking for information on his economic program. It seemed to me that everyone there was looking for facts about Henry George."

My niece Margaret Wilkinson of Toronto, was delighted to see a performance of "Oklahoma", on her first visit to New York. In expressing appreciation to me she said, "Well, I don't know much about Henry George, but if he was half as smart as his granddaughter Agnes De Mille, who did the choreography for "Oklahoma", I must find out what he said."

A report from Bill Truehart of Los Angeles, has just reached New York. Progress in this extension is more than encouraging—it is exciting. Mr. Truehart and his co-workers just a year ago recruited 98 students for the fall classes. In the Spring of 1943, 120 students were enrolled, and now for the 1943 fall term records show an enrollment of 210!
