A Forgotten Book Rediscovered By BENNETT CHALLIS

THE PROBLEM OF WAR AND ITS SOLUTION by John E. Grant published by George Allen & Unwin Ltd., London 1922, although now out of print, may be read in the library of the New York school and in some of the extension libraries. This great book, closely related to the works of Henry George, seems to have fallen into near oblivion; though the late Joseph Dana Miller, editor of Land & Freedom, regarded it as the best plea for social-economic justice that had appeared since Henry George.

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The book as a whole (384 pages) is a valuable addition to single-tax literature. No doubt is left that the ultimate objective, the abolition of want can only be attained when squabbling over land tenure has become obsolete, i.e., when the collection of ground rent is universally recognized and adopted as the only just and natural

ral source of public revenue.

There are at least seven chapters which teachers and advanced students of the Henry George School would profit by reading. These deal with heredity, environment, and the race question; equality of opportunity; monopolies, etc.
