The truth, of course, is still strong enough to break down error. Our experience with students in Sydney proves this. But our results are too slow. Our methods, our prestige and our public relations must be focused on building up Australia-wide cooperation in our movement. Our summer school in January offers special sessions for Georg-

ist workers and all are urged to attend. Participation in the discussions will strengthen and encourage us, and we trust, be profitable and pleasurable for participants.

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I believe we have made a mistake in interpreting socialism to mean the opposite of individualism. To my way of thinking, man cannot use himself unless he uses the earth he stands on; thus the power to charge man-rent for the use of the earth is the power to charge rent for man's use of himself.

In a free world men's competition to use themselves — to live by labor — under the most advantageous circumstances, will produce "rent," and the resultant power to collect rent must be either capitalized or socialized. Individual freedom would have more play under the latter.

We should strive for a monetary economy in which rent for the right to use the people's labor is collected by the people for the people. Money used in organizing and equipping people to increase their efficiency confers a greater rent-collecting power in proportion to the increase in efficiency effected. That is capitalism. Ignoring wars and depressions it makes for efficiency. It has played a beneficent part in social evolution, but it is based on a denial that the people have any inborn right to live by labor on this earth.

"Saved" money allows its owner to accumulate power to charge the community rent for the opportunity to live on earth by its own labor. He can sublet this power of charging rent for the use of the people to any entrepreneur he chooses.

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
