

In Memoriam

JOHN CARSON WEAVER died in New York on November 3, at age 89. Born in Pennsylvania, he was active for many years with the Georgist movement in Pittsburgh, especially the Henry George Foundation of America in which he was Recording Secretary. Mr. Weaver also conducted a long-lived radio talk show, the popular Allegheny Round Table. He was Secretary of Welfare under the Georgist Mayor of Pittsburgh, William N. McNair, in the 1930's. In 1979, Mr. Weaver, with his wife, moved to New York, where he was seen frequently at Georgist meetings. In 1983 he was presented with the Newcomb Incentive Award at a Henry George Institute dinner. His wife's death preceded his. He is survived by three sons, Fritz, Robert and Daniel, all of New York.

GEORGE TIDEMAN, 94, of Antioch, Illinois, died November 4. Born in Michigan, he spent most of his life in the Chicago area. Along with several other members of the Tideman family, he was a lifelong supporter of the philosophy of Henry George. He taught classes and wrote numerous letters to the press and to prominent persons. His daughter, Alice T. Scheske, writes: "Henry Tideman Jr. gave the eulogy at my father's service. I could not help but feel as though, through Harry, he got in his final punch to the very last. May this true disciple of Henry George meet his great leader in the life beyond."

Another recent death was that of FATHER MORTON A. HILL, S.J., associated with the St. Ignatius Loyola Church in New York and with Morality in Media. Introduced to the Georgist philosophy in the 1960's, he sought ways and means of introducing his fellow churchmen to it.

WAYNE S. BERRY of Spring Hill, Florida, died January 1 of this year. He was a teacher at the Henry George School in New York. After his retirement to Florida, he often wrote for newspapers, and one of his series, a modernized version of Progress and Poverty, has been published by the Henry George Institute.
