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WEDNESDAY FILM SERIES DURING JANUARY AT NEW YORK SCHOOL

"Land in Film" is the theme uniting a series of free films to be shown on Wednesday evenings at 5:30 during January at the New York Henry George School.

According to Director Stan Rubenstein, the series is intended to "break up the drab between-semester period and to bring our graduates together in an enjoyable and thought-provoking atmosphere."

The series kicks off on January 8th with Jessica Lange's sterling performance in the 1984 film, "Country."

Perhaps the greatest treatment on film of the ties that bind Americans to their land is John Ford's masterpiece, "The Grapes of Wrath." This landmark treatment of Steinbeck's novel, starring Henry Fonda, will be shown at the school on January 15th.

Another Nobel Prize-winning novelist, Pearl S. Buck, is represented during the January movie series. "The Good Earth," based on her novel of the same name and starring Paul Muni, will be featured on January 22nd.

The series concludes with Sally Field's Oscar-winning performance in the Robert Benton film, "Places in the Heart." She portrays a young widow struggling to hold her family and farm together in a small Texas town in the 1930s. This film will be shown on January 29th.

Each evening will conclude with refreshments in the basement lounge and a brief discussion of the film's handling of the social questions raised.

Because of their length, the movies will start promptly at 5:30 PM. Please make every effort to arrive on time.

VISIT TO CALIFORNIA

The phrase "from sea to shining sea" conjures patriotic images for most Americans, and it holds special meaning for Georgists. After all, our schools have been in operation on both coasts since the 1930s. Recently I visited California to get a taste of Georgist activities, western style. Although each organization has its own methods of promoting the philosophy, they all share common traits: dedication and enthusiasm.

San Francisco was highlighted by an all-day session with the school's Board of Trustees at Director Bob Scrofani's home. Programs here have their inception at this level, and there is considerable input from members. Then it is up to Bo and educational consultant Dionne Marx to implement them. Because new members are most welcome, there appears a steady flow of fresh ideas.

The Sacramento school, located in the state's capitol, is directed by Evelyn Friend. After meeting with a group of professional teachers, the Sacramento HGS Board discussed the relationship between their school and New York. Evelyn agreed to add to her duties the coordination of our high school program, cable programming and public relations.

An important meeting took place with Dr. Brooks, social studies coordinator of the State Board of Education. Dr. Brooks, Bob Scrofani and I discussed HGS input concerning the newly mandated economic education for high school students, due to take effect in two years.

Gathered at Mason Gaffney's home for a pot-luc dinner, the Los Angeles HGS Board held their monthly meeting. Coordinating programs and utilizing limited resources were major topics. Several subsequent evenings were spent observing sessions of Director Harry Pollard's "Classical Analysis." This course, five years in the making, is capable of being self-supporting and attracting new teachers, according to Harry.

Although San Diego doesn't have a Henry George School, Basic Economic Education President Floyd Morrow actively promotes our goals through weekly afternoon luncheons, development of computer programs teaching Georgist philosophy, audio-visual materials and a long-range program to offer our courses in an international university.

Programs differ from city to city but the camaraderie among Georgists in California is at a higlevel.

NEW YORK

Alanna Hartzok recently was part of a panel on "The United Nations -- Can We Abolish War?" in Santa Rosa. Other panelists included the presidents of the Campaign for U.N. Reform and the Northern California United Nations Association, the education chairman of the World Federalists and Congressman Doug Bosco.

In her remarks before the gathering of 250 people, Alanna linked public finance policy to the "common heritage" principle, calling it an important world order task.

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
