We mourn with our Danish Colleagues the departure of three friends whose passing was very sudden.

Arnold Poulsen, whose death occurred on November 6, was secretary of the Henry George Society and one of the beloved hosts at the recent international conference in Odense. He was a distinguished engineer and was noted as the inventor of the modern sound track.

Friends of Viggo Starcke were grieved to hear of the passing of his daughter, Vibeke, aged 30, on September 22. She was a journalist by profession and an accomplished musician.

Word comes also of Niels Pederson who died at the age of 65 after many years of loyalty to the ideals of the Justice party. Dr. Starcke referred to him as one of the able pioneers in that great movement.

Donald McDonald

Known to many as the "father of the Alaskan Highway," Donald McDonald of Fairbanks, Alaska, who visited the New York Henry George School when it was on 29th Street, made many Georgian friends. He will be remembered as a jolly fellow with a robust humor and many grandchildren. During that period he was called to the United States to discuss what route the proposed highway should take. Mr. McDonald was one of the prime movers in the effort which was made in the City of Everett, Washington to introduce land value taxation.

Royal E. S. Hayes

"Dr. Royal E. S. Hayes of Waterbury, Connecticut, long a member of the International Hahnemannian Association, died on July 20, 1952," as recorded in *The Homoepathic Recorder*, of which he was an associate editor. His accomplishments were well known to that profession and it was said of him that he had great skill in applying his knowledge for the benefit of the sick.

"In addition to being a skillful user of drugs, Dr. Hayes was an equally skillful user of words," wrote a contemporary. Some of this skillful use of words was demonstrated in earlier issues of *The Henry George News*, for Dr. Hayes was for many years an exponent of the philosophy of Henry George.
