



George A. R. Horsley Was St. Louis Donor

Late in January the St. Louis extension fittingly held a memorial conference from 2:30 to 5:30 P.M. in Hotel DeSoto, inspired by one George A. R. Horsley who took the basic course in 1942 and "did not forget."

Mr. Horsley repeated the course in 1944 and again in 1947, and took the trade course as well. He often remarked that his life had been enriched by his contact with the school which offered new hope for mankind, and he said he was going to do something for it.

When his will was read following his death in June, 1952, it was found that he had indeed kept his promise, for he left \$500 to the Henry George School in New York. Half of this was returned to the St. Louis extension, and in grateful appreciation of this gift present-day Georgists are asking themselves with renewed zest how they can stimulate interest in the economic and social ideals of freedom, and expand the services of the school as a civic enterprise. The school that has enriched one man's life feels it has a continuing obligation to enrich others.
