Mr. F. Folke is now editor of "Grundskyld," taking the place of Mrs. S. Bjorner, who is slowly recovering from a severe illness.

Mr. Folke writes that he has, by request, taken in hand the production of a film on the Social Programme of the Danish "Housemen" or smallholders, which features the historic Koge resolution on land value taxation, etc., with five lecturers taking the speaking parts. The film is to be exhibited before 1,100 local associations of the Housemen's federation. Mr. Folke adds: "Is it not wonderful that it is to us Georgists that they apply for such work? We can be proud and glad of it and can agree that in hardly any other country could a like event take place."

Mr Bue Bjorner, who was elected president of the Henry George League for the ensuing year, writes that not too much should be expected of him in his new post as president, in view of the many other matters in which he is heavily engaged. But we can be sure that he will fit as stated in LAND AND LIBERTY (Eng.). "The School," he says, "was run all during the occupation—as our protest to Nazidom-but, of course, we did not boost it too much. From September 1, 1945, up to the moment of writing we have started 34 new classes in Denmark. We have had to reprint Jakob Lange's POLITI-CAL ECONOMY this spring and the 'Student plans' for PROGRESS AND POVERTY. In September, 1943, I started a class on Democracy and Its Way in the concentration camp at Haserod. The Nazis were dumb enough to let the School send us the books, etc." Mrs. Caroline Bjorner, who conducts the School begun in 1937, was not likely to be baulked by any obstacle.
