The School in the News

SAN DIEGO audiences heard Mrs. Eva Maxwell, director of the Henry George School, interviewed on KGB on September 4th, and a few days later there was a dandy picnic at the home of Gordon and Julie Gran with movies, games, stunts and swimming. All this was a good prelude to the fall term which opened September 15th with classes in Coronado, Lemon Grove, La Jolla, Hillcrest, East San Diego and the Ocean Beach Community Center.

CHICAGO held two late summer commencement dinners for graduates completing the study courses at fourteen companies who are participating in the Commerce and Industry program. Frank Flick, president of the school's board of trustees and president of Flick-Reedy Corporation was the toastmaster, and James MacRae, director of conference leadership and educational television, led a round-table discussion relating current national and world problems to the economic fundamentals studied in the various groups.

DETROIT initiated its fall season with a talk by William Sloan, director-secretary of the Mayor's Committee for Industrial and Commercial Development on "Your Stake in Detroit's Industrial Growth." A fee of \$5 will be charged, and all groups will meet at the school headquarters, 78 Clinton Avenue, Newark.

Applications of General Semantics will again be under the leadership of Mrs. Joseph Meiers. Public Speaking will be offered by Joseph B. Rose, and the Great Books roundup goes into its second year with George Royal.

Robert Rodriguez, assistant director, has regrettably resigned to enter the insurance field after four years on the staff. He will continue to take charge of the film program two Friday evenings each month, however. There will be films on October 17th and 31st at eight p.m. On October 10th the Fridays at Eight program gets under way with "Around the World with the İGY" by Mrs. Mary Schiffman, and on October 24th Arthur Sopher will take a look "Behind the Bamboo Curtain."
