LOS ANGELES radio audiences by their enthusiastic response, have moved "Economics, by George" to "A" time — 6:30 Sunday evenings, following Drew Pearson on KABC. The program should now reach many more thousands, if the necessary funds can be raised to keep it on the air.

William Truchart, the director of the Los Angeles extension, sent an urgent appeal to all local friends asking them to make a weekly or monthly pledge to keep this valuable program alive. This is a great opportunity for all who believe in the Henry George principles. As Mr. Truchart said, "our spade work has been done."
