DETROIT friends are interested in House Bill No. 505 introduced by Representatives DeMaso and S. James Clarkson. This amends previously proposed legislation by providing that: "The governing body of any taxing unit in any year may levy separate and different rates of taxation for all purposes on all real estate classified as land exclusive of the buildings thereon and on all real estate classified as buildings on land."

Mildred J. Loomis of Brookville, Ohio spoke at the March 18th meeting on "The Interaction of Human Psychology and Economics." Patricia Bailey was chairman. Five classes began in March in and around Detroit.
