

Arnold Poulsen

The Danish Henry George movement has suffered a severe blow by the sudden death of one of its foremost personalities, Arnold Poulsen, who on November 6 succumbed to a severe heart attack. For some time past there had been warnings of the sort, but he did not allow them to interfere with his arduous duties which were many in both his professional and his public life. He was in his 64th year. This loss will be felt in circles also far beyond Denmark's boundaries. Very much of the success of the recent International Conference was due to work he put into it as Chairman of the Danish organising committee; and all who were present at the Conference will remember as one of its happiest features the part he took as President for the Danish section, particularly his brilliant chairmanship at the great public meeting which was broadcast over the State Radio. In business he was engaged in the film industry and as an inventor he made his mark as a pioneer of the sound track. His interest in the social question was unbounded—a most wise counsellor whose intellectual and moral co-operation as well as his financial assistance was never sought in vain. In this field he made an outstanding contribution, preoccupied as he was with his business affairs. The journal *Vejen*

Frem pays tribute to him as one of the noblest spirits in Denmark. He was a leader and one of the founders of Retsforbundet, the Justice Party, and was this year's President of the Danish Henry George Union. With all his friends in the Henry George movement we join in the mourning, and to his widow and their family we convey our sincere sympathy in their bereavement.
