Anna George de Mille

Anna George de Mille, beloved daughter of Henry George, has been carrying on his work throughout her lifetime. She is widely known throughout the United States as a lecturer on social subjects and has written stories and articles for the popular and the Georgist press.

Her knowledge of land reform as a strategic device for social reform she obtained as any student would, since her father never made an attempt to force his opinions on even his own children.

She is well known to thousands of Georgists in the United States and to Georgist leaders and workers throughout the world. With the aid of another Georgist leader, she prepared in 1924 an abridgement of "Progress and Poverty" that has been widely used.

From its organization she has been active in the Henry George School of Social Science, speaking at hundreds of meetings in various cities. With the aid of Miss Helen D. Denbigh, Brooklyn educator, and Lancaster M. Greene, New York broker, she interested British Georgists in establishing the Henry George School of Social Science in Great Britain, while the three were delegates to the London conference of the International Union for Land Value Taxation and Free Trade.

Mrs. de Mille has encouraged the publication of translations of "Progress and Poverty" in various languages. As president of the Board of Trustees of the School she has presided over its councils since its foundation.
