

*The Delaware "Single Tax" Campaign, the most picturesque happening in the history of the Henry George movement, came from a suggestion of Jackson H. Ralston that we should concentrate on some one state. He mentioned several, including Delaware.*

*The Philadelphia Single Tax Society decided on such a campaign in Delaware at once, and on Saturday, June . . ., 1895, Frank Stephens began our campaign by leading a little band of speakers into the state. Later a committee consisting of Arthur H. Stevenson, Ralston and myself was appointed to manage it with Frank in charge of the active work.*

*He gave up most of his time to it, and it was his unbounded enthusiasm, energy and ability to get good work out of others which made the movement, in its earlier days, such a striking success.*

*These songs were written in the beginning of the campaign, and were sung at meetings which were held all over the state, and at club assemblages. They did much to stimulate the spirit which sent our speakers, in the face of arrests and threats of assassination, into every town and village of the "Blue Hen State" to preach the Single Tax Gospel, and which provided 37 members of the "Dover Jail Single Tax Club," Frank Stephens being number two of that honorable body.*

*The army-like uniforms and knapsacks full of literature attracted great attention so that many leading papers gave us pages and pages with pictures. We, as Frank Stephens said, "plowed Delaware with a book and sowed it with a great thought," and although we did not get the Single Tax, Delaware was a better state because of that work.*
