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### **A Profile of David Woodhead**

DAVID WOODHEAD.

Mr. D. Woodhead was born in 1872 in the north of England. He came of a family of dissenters in the town which gave birth to Sir Robert Peel, and only six miles from the residence of England's Tribune, John Bright. He acquired sound democracy in his childhood by natural absorption. Although believing in land nationalization, it was not until he went to Texas, at the age of 18, that he became a Single Taxer, through reading Henry George and meeting the Houston Single Tax League, which organization he has served with enthusiasm for a number of years. For four years he was respectively secretary of the Houston Manufacturers' Association and of the Beaumont Chamber of Commerce; and in addition to his other duties largely secured the adoption by these business men of the principle of home rule in taxation. Mr. Woodhead, or "Dave," as he is called, is the youngest member of the Houston Single Tax League, but nevertheless has out-distanced most of them in that he is the father of two children. Mr. Woodhead possesses a keen analytical mind, a heart in sympathy with humanity, and, while not an orator, is a forceful and philosophic debater and can often press home the truth where more brilliant oratory would fail.
