**A Profile of H.F. Ring** H. F. Ring was born in the town of Worthington, Western Massachusetts, December 27th, 1853. He spent three years at Cornell University, having been a member of the class of '73; he was admitted to the bar at Dallas, Texas, in 1875, and shortly after became the law partner of the late ex-Governor James S. Hogg. In 1882 he moved to Houston, where he is now practicing his profession, being a member of the firm of Ewing & Ring, one of the leading law firms of Texas. It will be of interest to Single Taxers to know that Mr. Ring's law partner, Mr. Presley K. Ewing, is a brother of the Rev. Quincy Ewing, rector of Church of the Advent, Birmingham, Ala., an avowed Single Taxer, whose sermons have attracted wide attention.

In 1888 Mr. Ring delivered an address before a Knight of Labor assembly in Houston, in which he outlined the Henry George philosophy. This address was printed the next day in full in the Houston Post and soon after appeared in the Standard. Mr. George issued a tract containing this address, giving it the name of "The Case Plainly Stated."
